Our aims at St Thomas More Primary are to: fulfil the requirements of the National Curriculum for art by providing a broad and balanced curriculum, ensure the progressive development of knowledge and skills, enable children to observe and record from both first-hand experience and from their own imagination, to develop the children's confidence in controlling materials and tools, acquire new knowledge and become proficient in various art and design techniques and processes, begin to develop an awareness of the visual and tactile elements including; colour, pattern and texture, line and tone, shape, form and space, encourage enjoyment and appreciation	Implementation: To ensure high standards of teaching and learning in art, we implement a curriculum that is progressive throughout the whole school. Art is taught as part of a termly topic, focusing on knowledge and skills stated in the National Curriculum. At St Thomas More we feel that art is important in enabling all children to gain 'real-life' and 'hands-on' experiences. Our art planning is in line with the National Curriculum in England, which provides a broad framework and outlines the knowledge and skills taught in each Key Stage. When teaching art and design technology, teachers ensure their learning is engaging, broad and balanced. A variety of teaching approaches are used based on the teacher's judgement. Educational visits are another opportunity for the teachers to plan for additional art activities and learning outside of the classroom. At St Thomas More, the children have many opportunities to experience art on educational visits. The children have visited local museums, stately homes and Castles and also had visitors into school to share learning and have hands on experiences. More recently at St Thomas More Primary, teachers make use of the school grounds and outdoor learning area when planning for their students. We want young people to look back on a joyful schooling which has inspired and challenged them, given them wide opportunity and prepared them for the ups and downs of life.	Impact: Through art activities, we strive to prepare children to take part in the development of tomorrow's rapidly changing world. We aim to encourage children to become creative problemsolvers, both as individuals and as part of a team. Through the study of art, children combine practical skills with an understanding of aesthetic, social and environmental issues, as well as of functions and industrial practices. This allows them to reflect on and evaluate present and past art pieces, its uses and its impact. Our art activities are well thought-out and are planned to demonstrate progression. We focus on progression of knowledge and skills and discreet vocabulary progression also form part of the units of work. All leaders listen, grow relationships, act with integrity and care and expect the best from themselves and others in building a happy, confident school.
